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






# Students Group (Race) Math and ELA





Consulted with ELA Director and Literacy Coach to provide staff with a goal focused on the most problematic standard which is writing.

The specific standard is "producing clear and coherent writing in text constructed response and essays (opinion; informative/explanatory; narrative) in which the development and organization are appropriate to task, purpose and audience".

Met with staff who asked for assistance with teaching English Language Learners.

Met with EL Coordinator who created a Professional Development plan that focuses in two areas. First, whole staff (DYI development focused on collaborative planning between General Education and English Language Learner staff & DYM) professional development on inclusive practices for English Language Learners. Second, professional delivered to teaching teams during common planning times.

Increased EL staffing at DYIMS by 1 staff member (collaboratively scheduled between DYI & DYM)

### Tier I (Classroom Instruction)

- Implement curriculum maps to align classroom instruction in each grade level
- Implement Learning Walks so that evaluators strengthen their curriculum knowledge and observational skill
  - Focus on writing in ELA, an area in which students underperform
- Implement the Eureka -2-math curriculum which is improved and streamlined

## Tier II (Intervention, small group)

- Schedule regular whole class reviews with classroom teachers and interventionists to assess student need
- Flex intervention groups based on formative assessment data
  - Set specific goals for intervention

### AMENDMENT OF LEASE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF DENNIS AND THE DENNIS YARMOUTH REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

This Amendment of Lease is entered into as of this \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2023, by and between the Town of Dennis, a municipal corporation with an address of 685 Route 134, South Dennis, MA 02660, , acting by and through its Select Board, and the Dennis Yarmouth Regional School District, with an address of 296 Station Avenue, S. Yarmouth, MA 02664, acting by and through its Regional School District Committee.

### Recitals

Whereas, reference is made to that certain Lease Agreement, dated September 15, 2015, (the "Lease"), by and between the Town of Dennis ("Town") and the Dennis Yarmouth Regional School District ("District");

Whereas, the District has completed the construction of and now occupies the new Dennis Yarmouth Intermediate School located in Yarmouth; and

Whereas the District is no longer in need of using the Nathaniel H. Wixon Innovation School ("Wixon") building and site located in the Town for regional school purposes; and

Whereas, the District has notified the Town of its intention to terminate its lease with the Town for the Wixon School; and

Whereas, the Town is implementing the design of a wastewater treatment plant and associated sewer collection facilities, and has identified a portion of the Ezra Baker Elementary School ("Ezra Baker school;") located in Dennis and leased to the District that is required for a sewer pumping station; and

Whereas, the District has determined that a portion of the Ezra Baker School site needed for a sewer pump station is no longer needed for district school purposes; and

Whereas, the Cape and Vineyard Electric Cooperative (CVEC) operates a solar PV Project on the Wixon Site. The Town and CVEC have entered into an Assignment, Acceptance and Consent Agreement for the Wixon School Solar PV Project, which has been accepted by the District, an executed copy of which is attached to this Amendment of Lease as Exhibit 1.

Now, Therefore, the parties, for good and valuable consideration, agree as follows:

### Agreement

- 1. Effective November 1, 2023, that portion of the Lease referencing the Wixon School Site shall be removed from the Lease. The District agrees to turn over to the Town the Wixon School building and the Site in broom clean condition.
- 2. Effective November 1, 2023, the portion of the Ezra Baker Site, as shown on a plan attached as Exhibit 2 to this Lease Amendment, shall be removed from the Lease. The Town agrees that it will not construct and operate the sewer pump station in any manner that will interfere with the ingress and egress to the Ezra Baker School, especially for school buses, or any other disruption to the educational programs provided by the District at the site.
- 3. All other terms and conditions of the Lease shall remain in full force and effect.

### CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT AND ADOPTION

Constant adaptation and development of the curriculum is necessary if the District is to meet the needs of the students in its schools. To be successful, curriculum development must be a collaborative enterprise involving staff and administrators utilizing their professional expertise.

The School Committee will rely on the professional staff to design and implement instructional programs and courses of study that will forward the educational goals of the school district.

The Superintendent will have authority to approve new programs and courses of study after they have been thoroughly studied and found to support educational goals. The Committee itself will consider, and officially adopt, new programs and courses when they constitute an extensive alteration in instructional content or approach.

The Committee wishes to be informed of all new courses and substantive revisions in curriculum. It will receive reports on changes under consideration. Its acceptance of these reports, including a listing of the high school program of studies, will constitute its adoption of the curriculum for official purposes.

The Committee expects its faculty and administration to regularly evaluate the education program and to recommend modifications of practice and changes in curriculum content as well as the addition or deletion of courses to the instructional program.

### File: IGD - CURRICULUM ADOPTION

The School Committee will rely on its professional staff to design and implement instructional programs and courses of study that will forward the educational goals of the school system.

The Superintendent will have authority to approve new programs and courses of study after they have been thoroughly studied and found to support educational goals. The Committee itself will consider, and officially adopt, new programs and courses when they constitute an extensive alteration in instructional content or approach.

The Committee wishes to be informed of all new courses and substantive revisions in curriculum. It will receive reports on changes under consideration. Its acceptance of these reports, including a listing of the high school program of studies, will constitute its adoption of the curriculum for official purposes.

### File: IL - EVALUATION OF INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

The School Committee considers comprehensive and objective evalua-tion of the effectiveness of the curriculum to be of primary importance. The Superintendent will provide for the translation of the stated instructional goals into objectives and for appraisal of their implementation in order to:

- 1. Determine educational needs and provide information for planning.
- 2. Indicate instructional strengths and weaknesses.
- 3. Check on the suitability of programs in terms of community requirements.
- 4. Show the relationship between achievement and the system's stated goals.
- 5. Provide data for public information.

Elements of this evaluation process may include:

- 1. Testing programs such as nationally standardized general achievement tests, nationally standardized tests in specific subject areas, and tests administered by other agencies.
- 2. Study of school achievement records.
- 3. Study of students' high school and drop-out records.
- 4. Use of outside services, participation in regional research studies, contracted evaluation services; evaluation services at cost to the school system must be approved in advance by the School Committee.
- 5. Teacher and parent evaluation of student behavior.
- 6. State Dept. of Elementary and Secondary Education specialists and services.
- 7. Evaluation by the regional accrediting association.
- 8. Evaluation by other agencies.

An evaluation of the curriculum and its effectiveness will be made periodically and reported to the Committee by the Superintendent.

### File: IMA - TEACHING ACTIVITIES/PRESENTATIONS

It is the desire of the School Committee that the best available strategies for bringing about learning be utilized in the District's schools. The instructional staff shall be expected to keep abreast of new and promising instructional ideas and practices developed in schools throughout the nation and to apply those which have potential for improving the learning program in the District's schools.

An educational climate shall be established which shall be conducive to rational thought, inquiry, and respect for the dignity of the individual. This educational climate will assist students in learning how to think rather than what to think and shall provide students the opportunity to identify, express, and defend their opinions without penalty or fear of reprisal or ridicule.

Nothing in this policy shall limit a parent/guardian's right to file a complaint to challenge the use of teaching activity or presentation.

Isabella reported on fall sports, the upcoming National Honor Society Blood Drive; and the upcoming Fall play, *Murder on the Orient Express*.

### Building Committee Presentation – PMA

Chad Crittenden and Nicholas Hull from PMA gave a presentation about the new Dennis-Yarmouth Intermediate/Middle School. They showed artist renderings alongside actual pictures

of the building and grounds. They discussed the issue of the turf fields. There was a recent executive meeting and it was decided to have a third party, Haley & Aldrich, submit a proposal to address the turf field concerns. This is expected by Thanksgiving.

The project budget shows a savings of \$8.8M; a lot of the credit for that savings goes to the Building Committee and the School Committee. A question and answer session followed:

Chair Landers asked for an overview of the remaining items; Mr. Crittenden says the field lighting and punch list items remain. Mr. Glynn expressed concern about the turf fields; he does not want a quick fix and have problems later. Mr. Crittenden agrees and said it will not be a Band-Aid; it will be fixed. Mr. Glynn says it has been an exceptional project. Mr. Tierney thanked PMA; they have been working on this project since 2016 and many of the same people have been on the team. Mr. Flynn said that PMA is the best he has worked with over his 28 years.

Dr. Smith added that the turf fields will be fixed; that there are competing theories as to what is causing the issue and that is why they have looked to a third party.

Chair Landers asked when everything will be done and signed off; Mr. Crittenden said it is a long process before the building will be signed off and then MSBA has to do their audit. Mr. Morris thanked PMA for their presentation; particularly the original sketches shown alongside the current pictures.

<u>Dennis-Yarmouth Middle School Field Trip – Michael Bovino, Principal</u>

Further Voted: that each member of the Committee, the District Secretary and the District Treasurer be and hereby are, authorized to take any and all such actions, and execute and deliver such certificates, receipts or other documents as may be determined by them, or any of them, to be necessary or convenient to carry into effect the provisions of the foregoing votes.
